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THE EXISTING EVIDENCE BASE

- Between 1995-2022, 30,543 academic papers were found on the topic of circular economy
- 1.4% (425 papers) addressed decent work and the circular economy, peaking in 2021 (105 papers)

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- 84% of the studies reviewed focused on the Global North
- Global South focused reports largely related to waste management
- 80% macro-level analysis, compared to 11% for micro-level (industry) and 9% for meso-level (firm)



Figure 1. Publications that combine decent work and circular economy concepts between 1995 and 2022 from the perspective of countries in the Global North and the Global South.

KEY THEMES - CHALLENGES & OPPORTUNITIES

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Labour market and sectoral transformation

Working conditions & informality

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Skills development

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LABOUR MARKET TRANSFORMATION

- Job creation is CE's main social contribution though estimates differ and regional research on job transformation or loss is lacking
- Identifying key CE sectors such as maintenance, recycling, repair, and reuse is crucial for enhancing regional competitiveness.
- Limited CE impact-analyses on North-South dynamics -Mapping and monitoring CE strategies across existing value chains and trade arrangements is becoming an imperative



WORKING CONDITIONS & INFORMALITY

- Limited knowledge of CE impact on existing working conditions - Strong focus on OSH in waste and recycling, overlooking other aspects of decent work
- Informal and atypical work largely unquantified concerted efforts needed to understand the potential implications of CE strategies
- **Global North bias** Circular strategies often exclude the ubiquitous informal economy, particularly from the Global South.
- CE can create opportunities for social inclusion along emerging value chains - by improving collective bargaining and rights at work, e.g. through EPR schemes



SKILLS DEVELOPMENT

- **Circular jobs face similar hurdles as green** including market skill gaps and underinvestment in women's enterprises
- Policies should proactively support women as mid-skilled, male-dominated fields face job shifts.
- The empowerment potential for youth in circular jobs remains unexplored, especially in areas with high youth unemployment.



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04 WAYS FORWARD







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More granular inclusive evidence of work in the circular economy:

- Analyse the CE's impact on different regions, marginalized groups, and at the local level.
- Establish and implement globally applicable indicators.

Conduct global and socially just research and policy-making:

- Exchange best practices and perform thorough country-level and value chains analyses
- Investigate necessary policy measures and indicators to aid in design and impact evaluation.

Foster joint advocacy and partnerships for data and knowledge:

- Collaborate with local and international entities to revise industrial classifications, addressing the omission of the CE in existing datasets
- Guarantee that CE advocacy includes socioeconomic outcomes.
